Crisis Relief and Recovery exists to train, prepare, and deploy leaders to serve and restore communities in crisis.




We continue to believe we are most effective when we:

Steinhatchee and Jena, FL



Following our relief mission, we trained and continue to support a Community Long-Term Recovery Group to help rebuild homes lost in the hurricane.



Close partners Adventures in Missions were contacted during our early ADVON deployment to Hurricane Ian in October 2022. Crisis Relief and Recovery conducted a handover of the first Recovery Operations Base -- nicknamed "The ROC" -- to Chris and Sarah Horvath, who have since coordinated over 4600 volunteers to continue the rebuilding work after Operation PERFECT STORM.

In 2023, Crisis Relief and Recovery was accepted as an Airlink Partner. Airlink is a global humanitarian organization providing free airlift and logistical solutions to nonprofit partners, and is saving CRR thousands of dollars in travel costs during each operation, which allows us to deploy to more disaster areas.

As part of our transition to redeploy (return home) from Operation RIVER RUN, we trained community leaders on the Long Term Recovery Group system. Through the coordination of this group and the potential grant sponsorship of SBP, we hope to rebuild multiple homes in the Steinhatchee and Jena communities, helping families that can not help themselves.




HOME AWAY FROM HOME

Whether it is Recovery Operations Team training for retirees and RVers, online Disaster Relief Volunteer training, or our benchmark Immediate Relief Team training and assessment, we strive for real-world training with classroom discussion, practical scenarios, and team building tasks. It is this training that creates a cohesive team of brothers (and sisters)-in-arms, who can trust one another in disaster relief operations and dangerous situations.





INNOVATION AND ADAPTATION

We want to be on the cutting edge of disaster leadership, and that means we will always be pushing the boundaries of what is capable within our mission. Developing our use of aerial drones for reconnaisance, building a state-of-the-art mobile operations center and communications hub, and designing a multifaceted case and operations management system for use during and after disasters are all goals for the next year.

SEARCH AND RESCUE

Part of our commitment to become one of the industry leaders for disaster relief is to expand our capabilities across all phases of disaster While in 2023 we have management. expanded our ability to support communities long-term, in 2024 we will begin developing our organizational ability to conduct search and rescue operations in both urban and wilderness settings. This will allow us to contribute during more phases of disaster, and developing these skills make our team members more valuable to their own communities around the country.
